In the Shadow of the Moon: Eclipses as Probes of the Earth and Cosmos

Wednesday, October 11

North America will be treated to two eclipses in the coming months. On October 14, an annular eclipse (a “ring of fire”) will be visible across the American West, from Oregon to the Texas coast. On April 8, 2024, a total solar eclipse will cross the continental United States, providing millions of people with the opportunity to see an eclipse in person. It will pass through Illinois on its way from Texas to Maine.

Astronomer Shane Larsen returns to help you enjoy these phenomena. He'll explore how eclipses have historically helped us develop a better understanding of the Earth and its place in the cosmos, review the basics of solar eclipses, and talk about what to expect and how to safely enjoy them. Dr. Larsen is a research professor of physics at Northwestern University, where he is the Associate Director of CIERA (Center for Interdisciplinary Exploration and Research in Astrophysics).

TRANSFORMING POLITICS, ONE CONVERSATION AT A TIME

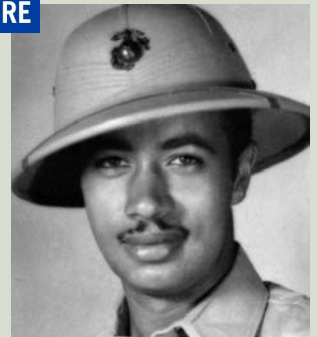
